The past term has been another energetic one at Red Hill Consolidated School. With student learning at the heart of what we do our students, staff and community have continued to work with dedication. To everyone involved in making learning exciting, engaging and meaningful for students we say "Thank You".

Over the holidays, we are having ceiling repairs being carried out in our Grade 2 classrooms, Grade 1 corridor, Prep corridor and the curved corridor. High levels of effort and excellent behaviour most certainly have a long-term impact on a student's ability to achieve their best possible outcomes.

This week Mrs Marshall has been on long-service leave, travelling Mongolia and China. We look forward to her return at the start of Term 3 and to hearing stories of her trip. For the first two weeks of next term, Mr Wettenhall will be on leave before returning to his new role of Acting Assistant Principal. In his absence, Miss Jana King will be our contact person for any students needing wellbeing support.

Please be aware that the first day of next term is a pupil free day. On this day, staff will be undertaking CFA training updates and participating in a workshop focused on "Building resilience and well-being in schools." Mr Joe Corbett an expert in this area is facilitating this workshop. **The first day for students is Tuesday July 17th.**

At our final assembly for the term tomorrow, we will be awarding some new and very special awards at Red Hill. Every term we will now present certificates to four students each term who have most consistently demonstrated our Learner Assets of Thinker, Inquirer, Collaborator and Self-Manager. This is part of our commitment to continually recognise and acknowledge students who demonstrate great learning behaviours.

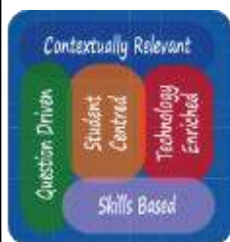

School Councillor Report

Dear School Community,

Last week's school council meeting marked the middle of the school year, with four council meetings now completed.

In this meeting, Leanne Marshall presented her Principals report, in which she discussed the reluctant farewell of Ben Clapp from his role as Assistant Principal. Leanne went on to discuss how Gus Wettenhall would take on the Acting Assistant Principal position, Jo Barnes and Nicky Heffernan will share the role of teaching and learning leadership. We wished Ben Clapp well in his new Assistant Principal role in Singapore, and thanked him for the wonderful contributions he has made to our school over the past 4.5 years.

The school council accepted some generous support from the Red Hill Op Shop, and agreed that those funds should be allocated to teachers, to be used in their classrooms for new furniture. Also discussed was the suggestion of holding a Father's Day event this year. It is hoped that lots of Dads can come to school one morning leading up to Father's Day and have a bit of time at school with their children. Plans for the event are being prepared.

Outside the Grade 4 classroom areas is next in line to receive a spruce up. Andrew Sides has identified ways to change paths, introduce some new paths, and add some artificial turf areas. These improvements will help to keep dirt outside of classrooms, stop puddles forming, and provide a more serviceable surface for student traffic. Funds for this project is coming from Art Red Hill fundraising.

The council discussed the constant need to encourage parents to pay their voluntary contribution towards running the swimming pool. Our school struggles to fund the running of our pool and swimming program. Our school is completely dependent on your contribution.

School council approval for the Japanese excursion was finalised in this meeting. We congratulated Bronwyn Harder for her extensive work and detailed planning of this trip. The lucky students attending this excursion will be very well cared for, and get to compare student life in Japan, with their student experience at Red Hill. Very exciting.

Finally, Leanne Marshall wanted to acknowledge the hard work of the teaching staff, especially at this time of year. Teachers have been very busy writing student reports leading up to the mid-year break. In addition, she acknowledges the extra efforts made by teachers who have relocated their classrooms, due to building repairs. Our school is a site of constant change. To all staff, students, and to the whole school community, have a great mid-year holiday.
