Dear families and friends,

It's currently full steam ahead up at Red Hill Consolidated School, so I'll launch straight into the news this week. Firstly, if you were one of the randomly selected families who received an invitation to take part in our school's **Parent Opinion Survey**, I hope that you can take the time to participate. The survey only takes 10-15 minutes to complete and will provide us with valuable feedback that will be used to assist our future planning. Currently, only 44 of the 185 families who received this invite have completed the survey. It is a DET requirement for a school of our size to have 85 completed responses. The survey remains open until Sunday the 11th of August. Thankyou to those families who have already completed this survey.

Our **School Review** officially begins next week with our Validation Day on Wednesday the 14th of August. All Victorian schools are reviewed every four years and this is a valuable opportunity to reflect on previous goals and implementation strategies, celebrate achievements and milestones as well as identify areas for improvement, which will be used to set goals for our next Strategic Plan. This process also involves an audit our school's policies and procedures. Our review panel will consist of our reviewer, our Senior Education Improvement Leader, two challenge partners, Joanne Barnes, Nicky Heffernan, our School Council President, Naomi Douglas and myself. A big part of the Validation Day will be visiting classrooms to help provide our panel with a deeper understanding of our approach to teaching and learning. Our school reviewer will also be talking to staff members and students throughout the day as well as analysing our whole school achievement data. By the end of this Validation Day, the panel will have set the focus questions or terms of reference for the rest of our review process. I will keep you updated with this process in future newsletters.

Last week our Grade 4 team were treated to an engaging presentation by **Lionel Lauch from Living Culture**. Lionel shared his knowledge of Indigenous culture and way of life as well as teach our students and teachers how to throw a spear. This incursion helped our Grade 4 students with their Learning Exploration, understanding what life in Australia was like before European settlement.

The students and teachers really enjoyed this experience and learned a great deal about our country's First People.

Although it is only August, we are already beginning to make initial plans for 2020. If you already know that your child will not be attending Red Hill Consolidated School next year for any reason, we would appreciate you informing us in writing as soon as possible.  As you are aware, Red Hill Consolidated School went paperless with our school reports for the first time last semester, drastically reducing our impact on the environment as well as the time taken to print, compile and envelope. Parking Around the School


Parent's picking up their children on Tuesday afternoon this week may have noticed parking attendants and police observing our traffic conditions. I also spent some time with a representative from the shire discussing and watching the challenges we face during pick up times. We will continue to work with the Shire on a solution to our traffic problems and further visits will be scheduled. However, I was quite shocked at some of the dangerous behaviours of drivers. Many cars were parked illegally and dangerously and I witnessed several cars jump the queue for our pick up lane and others perform dangerous u-turns. I was also alarmed to see a number of children being called across our busy roads, less than fifty meters from our crossing. I urge you to remain patient during pick ups and drop offs and ensure you follow all road rules and abide by all parking signs. In addition, please encourage your child to use the school crossing.

This week I was lucky enough to be invited to the Red Hill Consolidated heat of the Lions Club Public Speaking competition. During the evening the students participating astounded me with their confidence and clarity as they spoke. They stood in front of a large group and spoke for 3 minutes, often without notes or prompts, and each of them captivated the audience with their presentation. We had 14 students participating and each of them should be congratulated. Well done to Freddy, Georgia, Grace, Cass, Molly, Charlotte, Caitlin, Fenella, Ada, Rylan, Kye, Eliza, Lola and Sophie. Special thanks to Mr. James Graham and Ms. Lucy Welsh who helped the students prepare for the competition.



I was very glad that I was not one of the judges as it would have been an incredibly tough decision to choose winners as each and every child did an amazing job! However, on the night the judges deemed that Georgia and Lola should proceed to the next stage in the competition. They also highly commended Charlotte and Rylan.

On the evening I spoke to parents and many commented on the fact that they would never have had the confidence to stand and speak in front of an audience at such a young age. Upon reflection I thought the same of myself and that got me thinking about how is the learning experience now allowing for our students to develop such strong speaking skills?

In days of yesteryear, classrooms were not a place where students were encouraged to speak. A popular quote amongst grown-ups was “Children should be seen and not heard!” However current research highlights the importance of developing classroom cultures where conversation and dialogue is essential. But why are conversations so important? Here are some of the many benefits of classrooms that have conversation as a key component of the teaching and learning process:

- Conversations engage learners.
- Conversations allow us to engage the children in their own learning.
- Engaging children in conversations and listening to their ideas gives them a voice in our classrooms.
- Conversations show we value and respect children’s thinking and learning.
- Children feel more connected to and therefore participate more fully in all kinds of learning experiences.
- Talking allows ideas and vocabulary to grow.
- When children listen to others their thinking grows.
- Participation in substantive conversations gives children the opportunities to practise and use skills in questioning, reflecting, planning, evaluating and to make connections to essential skills for learning.
- Conversations allow children to develop a view of themselves and people who have positive contributions to make to the world.
- Children find more purpose in learning experiences that explore their own ideas about things through conversations.
- Children are motivated, through conversations, to search and find answers to their questions to build their own understanding.
- Teachers benefit from conversations by increasing insight into children’s understandings, ideas and confusions.
- Teachers use this knowledge to help plan an engaging and challenging learning environment for the children in their class.

Conversation isn’t just important in the classroom but also at home.

Our challenge is to find time to have these meaningful, insightful conversations with our children daily.
