

Our teachers and support staff have now started the process of creating class lists for next year. Every year we spend countless hours developing class lists to balance many factors. Quite often, what seems like a straightforward request or move can throw out an entire cohort. Students will meet their new teacher and classmates on Tuesday the 13th of December, in the afternoon.

Last week we met our 2023 Prep students for the first time. This was the first of four prep transition events. Our new students settled in to their new environment very quickly and I'm sure they made new friends and feel more comfortable about starting school next year. Our prep teachers were all very impressed with our newest students. This was also the first time since 2019 that we could meet with our new parents and families in person while our students attended their transition session. It was a great opportunity to welcome new and existing families to our school and for parents to meet one another. We have a number of information sessions for new parents over the coming weeks.

Please don't forget that our teachers, especially those in junior grades are always on the lookout for parent helpers. Being a parent helper is often a very rewarding experience and a great way to meet other parents. Generally, we need parent helpers in the morning to help with our literacy sessions, but there are always other opportunities to get involved. As you know, we require helpers in the pool for this program to run and we always need volunteers for camps and excursions. And for those of you who are free, we have a Garden Centre working bee scheduled for the 17th of November, straight after school. Please don't forget that helpers are required to sign in at the office and must have a valid Working With Children's Card. If you are interested in helping out at school, please get in contact with your child's teacher.

Our Colour Run is fast approaching, but there is still time to sign up and raise funds. As a school we have already reached our fundraising target, which in addition to a grant from the Mornington Peninsula Shire and contributions from the VSBA, means that we have almost enough to fund our solar panel installation on the new building. This is very exciting news. Our Colour Run Team are now organising the event itself, which will take place on Friday the 2nd of December. This is set to be one of the highlights of 2023.

Speaking of fundraisers, keep your eyes peeled for a school fundraiser with a difference. We have been approached by a company called Circonomy who will be organising a collection of smart devices at RHCS to correlate with World Recycling Week. All devices collected will be recycled or refurbished, with all data being deleted sensitively. In addition, every device collected will earn the school \$5.00. All funds raised will go towards our school's sustainability program.



And finally this week, here's a sneak peak of our Lower Sandy Playground design, due to commence over the school holidays. This playground was designed in consultation with our school's Student Voice Team. As well as a shiny new playground and new soft fall matting, we hope this project will solve our drainage problems in this area of the school. As many of you know, the existing playground is old, with many components de-commissioned and is often out of bounds due to flooding. In addition to this project, the asphalt driveway on the southern side of the prep classrooms is scheduled to be resurfaced over the summer holidays.

CLE UPDATE



In 2023, we will be introducing a Bring Your Own Device (BYOD) program at Red Hill Consolidated School. In the first year we will be encouraging our Year 4 students to bring a device that will be used as a tool to enhance and extend learning.

The focus of the BYOD program at Red Hill Consolidated School is to provide tools and resources to the 21st-Century Learner. A

successful BYOD program requires technology to be seamlessly integrated throughout the school's curriculum. Increased access to technology is essential for teaching students skills for a future in which, as societal trends suggest, digital literacy is key. The individual use of personal devices is a way to empower students to work to their full potential and develop essential learning habits with the support of digital tools.

Learning results from continuous dynamic interaction among students, educators, parents and the extended community. Technology immersion does not diminish the vital role of the teacher. On the contrary, it transforms the teacher from a director of learning to a facilitator of learning. Effective teaching and learning with technology integrates technology into the curriculum any time, any place.

Importantly, having access to a device teaches children the rules of online behaviour, including how to safely interact online whilst at home and in the classroom too. Schools can monitor internet safety for children and can guide them about online etiquette.

From a convenience perspective, being able to work on the one device at school and at home allows children to complete a task seamlessly – work is kept in the same place and students have uninterrupted access to a device. In addition, having access to various apps allows children to create for the purpose of learning, collaborate with their peers and share their work.

One of the key components of the Contemporary Learning Experience is that learning is 'Technology Enriched'. Students will be using laptops in a variety of ways to enhance their learning. Moving to a BYOD model will increase the learning capacity of students by:

- enabling personalised learning through access to rich learning resources.
- continuous access to educational materials allowing learning to happen anywhere, anytime.
- providing an engaging, interactive environment for learning.
- strengthening links between home and school, allowing parents to see, every day, what their children are learning at school and have relevant, timely, accurate and quality conversations around student learning and progress.
- allowing students, the opportunity to display prior knowledge of topics and thus be co-constructive in their own learning journey.
- maximising independent and resilient learning.

We are very excited about beginning this journey and look forward to seeing the positive impact it has on teaching and learning.


