Dear Families,

I hope you have all survived the wet and wild conditions over the past two weeks. It looks like the weather is gradually improving, just in time for our Grade 5 Campers. Wet day timetables have been commonplace to start the term, which is a little unusual for this time of year. I have been very impressed with the number of students wearing their broad brimmed hats now that the sun has finally appeared this week. Well done.

School Review

As you may have read in our last newsletter, we have started the term with our school review process. This 4 yearly process has included classroom observations, staff, parent and student forums as well as some lengthy panel discussions looking at our achievement and progress towards our whole school goals over the previous four years. This is a very valuable experience for our school to not only review our progress, but set our future direction. I have heard that our students spoke beautifully about their learning and all spoke very highly of their wonderful teachers. To date, the feedback has been all positive and the panel is very impressed with all of the amazing things happening in our school. I would like to thank all parents, staff and students who have contributed to our school review. Our Review Panel day will take place on Monday the 23rd of October, where the findings and recommendations will be presented.

Power Outages

Unfortunately, we have experienced a number of unplanned power outages since returning this term. Talking with many of our parents, it seems as though this is occurring more and more frequently in our community and impacting many households. When the power goes at RHCS, we are left without water. Our toilets will flush for a short period of time, but we lose water to all of our taps. We also lose our servers and phones, making communication more difficult. I would like our families to understand that we are prepared for these situations and, although power outages create a major disruption to our school operations and programs, our students and staff are safe. In these instances, we will always communicate with our families and provide advice on how to get in touch with us. I am working with the Department to hopefully develop a better response to power outages in the future.

Bus Travel Reminders

A reminder to all families who use our bus services about the importance of safe courteous behaviours at the bus stops. It is a condition of travel for primary school aged children that they are met at the bus stop by an adult each afternoon. In order to ensure our buses run to schedule it is essential that the parents are at the bus stop on time. It is also an expectation that students are demonstrating our school value of responsibility when at the bus stop. Many of the roads in our community are hazardous and, in order to ensure the safety of our students, we recommend that bus stops not be used as play spaces. We also ask our parent community to be mindful of property owners and not to block driveways or obstruct traffic when parking at the bus stop.

Walk to school

With the improvement in weather and less rain predicted for the coming weeks, I would like to ask families to consider parking at the Red Hill Reserve and walking to and from school each day. This is a short, safe and picturesque walk and a great way for everyone to start and end their day. As well as the health benefits, the more families that choose to walk to school, the less congestion there will be around our school during drop off and pick up times. Although I haven't timed it, I would think the walk may even be a quicker option on some days?

Swimming

Swimming is always a highlight during Term 1 and 4 and the swimming pool has looked particularly inviting this week with the sun out. As a registered aquatic facility, we have developed and adhere to a strict testing regime. To assist us in maintaining the pool to the regulated standard could you please refer to and adhere to the following guidelines.

Inclusive Education at Red Hill

October is Dyslexia Awareness Month, with this year's theme, 'Stronger Together' as when we work together, we can achieve anything. Dyslexia is one of the most common forms of specific learning disability. Central features of dyslexia include difficulties with accurate or fluent word decoding, reading and spelling, together with a delayed response to intervention. Dyslexia is a lifelong condition. However, students with dyslexia can learn to read with fluency and accuracy given intensive, evidence-based intervention over extended periods. At Red Hill our dyslexic learners are supported through small group and individual intervention using evidence-based programs and resources such as The Little Learners Love Literacy Program and Decodable Readers and in the classroom through inclusive education practices. In 2022 the whole staff undertook Professional Development in Dyslexia and literacy difficulties and continue to build capacity in this area.

Look out for the "Light it Red for Dyslexia Campaign" as various significant monuments, buildings and landmarks across Australia will be lit up in RED for Dyslexia Awareness Month.

School preparations for the bushfire



Each year, to prepare for bushfires and grassfires, schools and early childhood services complete a range of activities.

The Department of Education runs an annual fire risk assessment of schools and early childhood services. They are allocated a category of risk (categories 0 to 4) and are published on the Bushfire At-Risk Register (BARR).

All schools and early childhood services listed on the BARR and Category 4 list will also close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district.

When the Bureau of Meteorology provides public fire danger rating forecasts or fire weather warnings, they use fire weather district areas. In Victoria, there are 9 fire weather districts, which are based on Local Government Area boundaries. Our school is in the Central fire district.

As part of preparing our school for the fire season, we have updated and completed our Emergency Management Plan and completed a range of maintenance works that assist in preparing our school for the threat of fire including clearing our school grounds, removing vegetation around school buildings and clearing the gutters.

What does this mean for our school?

Our school has been identified as being at risk of bushfire or grassfire and is a Category 3 school.

Our school will close on a day forecasted as Catastrophic fire danger rating in Central fire district.

What is the department's policy?

The department's <u>Bushfire and Grassfire Preparedness Policy</u> requires all schools and early childhood services on the BARR and the Category 4 list to close when a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast in their fire weather district. All school bus routes which travel in or through a district with Catastrophic fire danger must also be cancelled. School preparations for the bushfire season

When will our school be closed due to Catastrophic fire danger?

Our school will close on a day forecasted as Catastrophic fire danger rating in Central fire district.

Closure of the school due to a forecast Catastrophic day will be confirmed on the day prior and we will provide you with advice before the end of the school day. Any information regarding potential or confirmed Catastrophic fire dan-

Once confirmed, the decision to close will not change, even if the weather forecast changes. This is to avoid confusion and help your family plan alternative care arrangements for your child. It is also important to be aware that:

- No one will be on site on days where the school is closed due to a forecast Catastrophic day.
- Out-of-school-hours care will also be cancelled on these days.
- All bus routes that travel through the Catastrophic area will be cancelled.
- School camps will be cancelled if a Catastrophic fire danger rating day is forecast for fire weather district in which the camp is located, or if the travel involves passing through areas that have Catastrophic fire danger.

Families are encouraged to action their Bushfire Survival Plan on Catastrophic fire danger rating days. **On such days, children should never be left at home alone or in the care of older children.**

For those of us living in a bushfire prone area, the Country Fire Authority (CFA) advises that when Catastrophic days are forecast, the safest option is to leave the night before or early on the morning of the Catastrophic day.

What can families and the school community do to help us prepare?

Ensure we have your current contact details, including your mobile phone numbers.

Keep in touch with us by reading our newsletters, regularly checking Class DoJo and checking our website https://redhillcs.vic.edu.au/

Make sure your family's bushfire survival plan is up-to-date and includes alternative care arrangements in the event that our school undertaking learning from home and/or closed due to elevated fire danger or closed due to a Catastrophic fire danger. Further information can be found on the CFA's website.

• Action your family's bushfire survival plan if your own triggers are met. Our school community may be spread out across many areas and some families may be at higher risk than others. Your family's safety is critical, so please let us know if you are actioning your bushfire survival plan and if your children will be absent on these days.

If your child is old enough, talk to them about bushfires and your family's bushfire survival plan.
