CLE UPDATE



It has been a very busy time at Red Hill Consolidated School. As you would all know, we have been undergoing a School Review which concluded last week. During this process, we work with a panel made up of a DET appointed reviewer, our network's Senior Education Improvement Leader and two challenge partners from other schools. The panel, together with representatives from our school, spent time in classrooms, observing the teaching and learning practices in place at RHCS. They also conducted forums with staff, students and parents and spent time investigating different data sets as well as looking through all our curriculum documentation. Thank you to the different members of our school community that participated in the review process. Your contributions and opinions were valued by the panel.

After their investigation, the panel collaborated to develop two goals that will form our school's Strategic Plan. These goals will be the focus of our work as staff for the next four years and will be actioned through our yearly Annual Implementation Plans.

The first goal is focused on improving student performance across all curriculum areas. This involves us working to consistently embed our instructional model in all classrooms. We will also continue to refine our whole-school approach to assessment, allowing teachers to accurately determine each student's point of need, and will further develop the capacity of our teachers to differentiate the learning to cater for a range of abilities.

The second goal looks to increase the engagement of students in their learning. To achieve this goal, we will be working to reinvigorate and strengthen our inquiry approach. We will also be empowering students to have greater agency in their learning by providing opportunities for them to co-design learning experiences.

Whilst there was a lot of work in preparing for and undergoing review, it was a reaffirming experience for staff. The panel highlighted the positive culture that we have at Red Hill, commenting on our amazing learners and dedicated staff.

Writer's Notebooks

Over the next few newsletters, I look forward to sharing with our school community about Writer's Notebooks and how this tool enhances the writing experience for our students. You might have noticed that we did not include a notebook on the 'Educational Items to Own' list for 2024. That is because we want to encourage our learners to find a notebook that suits them. Some might choose blank pages, whilst others prefer lines. Some will like a large book, but others will prefer a small notebook they can take with them. Some learners will choose to decorate the front covers of their notebooks while others leave them plain. The most important thing is that all our writers, including teachers, have a notebook ready to start 2024.

I have just started a new notebook myself. My notebook has lined and plain pages which I think is great. It bought it in Malaysia when travelling earlier this year and it has a beautiful wooden 'Wau' on the front. A wau is a traditional Malaysian kite that farmers used to fly over their rice paddies. As a writer, I'm already thinking about what I might add to its currently empty pages. I'm excited to see the notebooks our learners choose and even more excited to think of the great writing that the pages of these notebooks will contain!
